HIV: United States (Source: CDC)

Nearly 250,000 women are living with HIV/AIDS in the United States (2018)





Black women represent 13% of people living with HIV/AIDS, compared to 3.8% for white women

Black women represent 11% of new HIV diagnosis, compared to 4.1% for white women

INTERSECTION BETWEEN INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE & HIV:

"Several studies have examined the relationship between violence and the timing of becoming infected with HIV or disclosing HIV status. These studies suggest that IPV can be both a risk factor for HIV, and a consequence of HIV." (CDC, 2010 - conclusion of meta-analysis of over 30 studies)


Key Points:

Women 4x more likely to experience antiretroviral adherence "failure" after recent domestic violence



One in five women reported domestic violence after seroconversion disclosure


Prevalence of Experiences (by race, women):













